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
BBCCC General Assembly 2006

It is where members come together, be informed about the existing status of the Cooperative, vote for officers and certain amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws, and it is also a time where members can verify certain issues or concerns with regard to the operations of the Coop.

This year's GA was once again held last March 26, 2006 at the Gonzaga Compound of Saint Louis University along Gen. Luna Road, Baguio City. As early as 7:30 a.m. members started to come to register and participate in this year's activities and festivities. There were members who set up food booths in the compound, some were selling other non-food products, and the rest even took the opportunity to advertise their businesses. It was really a day of business and festivities.

Aptly, the GA program started with a Eucharistic Celebration officiated by Rev. Roland Astudillo. COOPERATIVISM AND LABOR UNIOISM

Advocacies relative to cooperatives and to labor organizations are not incompatible as they are in fact a match-up and reinforcing to one another. These institutions have become a necessity especially when the people are struggling for survival, for economic upliftment or partnership, for community assurance, for bonding, and for social justice. It is likewise the solidarity fostered in cooperativism and labor unionism that provides a sense of "we belong" and security among the members thereof.

By nature, a cooperative is an organization with a common bond among the members who pool their resources together for their availment and compatible purposes redounding directly or ultimately to their benefits and advantages. A labor union is similarly a bonding of workers to promote and protect their rights and interest because "in union there is strength". The power of organizational adherence and proper mobilizations make the separate identities of the cooperative and labor union alike.

Both being a primary economic mass organization, the members in a cooperative and labor union hardly belong to the elite class. And the existence of members in a labor organization is determined by continuity of employment in the same manner as a cooperative filiation is determined by the ability of the member to patronize the cooperative according to the business standards as set forth by the latter.

They are juridical persons and the required operative act is the registration of the cooperative with the Cooperative Development Authority (CDA) and that of the labor union with the DOLE's Bureau of Labor Relations. While a cooperative cannot legally operate without registration with the CDA, a labor union despite not being registered may, directly through its members, still seek redress of grievances from the employer.

Registered cooperatives transacting business exclusively with their own members are not subject to tax and fees. Income and properties of a legitimate (registered) labor organization, including grants, endowments, gifts, donations, and contributions as well as fringe benefits covering the so-called *de minimis* benefits, although under certain ceilings, are not taxable.

Jurisprudence adjudicates that workers who are at the same time members of the cooperative cannot form a labor organization for the purpose of collective bargaining since they are a part of their employer. It follows that employees in a cooperative who are not members thereof may form and register a labor union of their own provided that the union members constitute at least 20% of all the employees in the cooperative (bargaining unit).

There is no question that cooperatives and labor unions should be a part or at least be consulted in government decision-making on matters affecting them. Labor unions especially the big ones by their stature are a force to reckon with in politics; cooperatives are sure potent force. The day shall come when we no longer beg to the politicians but for cooperativism and labor unionism to be indispensable considerations in Philippine governance.

Real cooperatives and labor organizations of whatever type exist for the improvement of life of all the members thereof; they are meant for the welfare of cooperators and laborers and even of society at large.

Incumbent Chair Bernard D. Padang and Vice-Chair Oscar R. Adversalo were unanimously re-elected for the same positions during the Board of Directors re-organization meeting held at the BBCCC Board Room on April 3, 2006.

Pursuant to the "working board" concept, the Board appointed the following as committee chairs: Dir. Nelson V. Gayo for Legal Committee; Dir. Mario S. Valdez for Research and Development Committee; Dir. Josephine G. Perez for Youth Committee; Dir. Emerita C. Fuerte for Housing Committee; Dir. Renato C. Fernandez for Coop Linkages. Under the BBCCC By-Laws, the Vice-Chair is automatically the Chair of the Education Committee.

The Board also appointed the members of the different Board-created committees, as follows: Housing Committee - Ma. Asuncion Minglana and Albert Talco; Legal Committee - Atty. Zosimo M. EDITORIAL:

CETF

CETF. COOPERATIVE EDUCATION AND TRAINING FUND. Under R.A. 6938, better known as "The Cooperative Code of the Philippines", an amount which shall not be more than 10% of the net surplus of the cooperative shall be allocated for cooperative education and training purposes. The law specifically provides that half of the fund shall be spent by the cooperative for education and training purposes, while the other half shall be credited to the CETF of the apex organization of which the cooperative is a member (where an apex organization may be a federation or union). As a matter of fact, the BBCCC allocates annually 5% of its net surplus for CETF.

During the open forum of the 47th Annual General Assembly of BBCCC held on March 26, 2006, a member proposed that the current 5% CETF allocation be reduced to 3% so that there would be a bigger amount for distribution to the members in the form of interest on share capital and patronage refund. However, another member boldly opposed the proposal and instead argued and moved for the retention of the 5% CETF allocation, and floated the idea that the rate of allocation may even be raised.

It appears that the proponent for lower rate of allocation missed the whole point. Was he saying that higher "dividends" are preferred to better services? "Dividends" are not the be-all and end-all of cooperativism. In fact, services are, for a member-based organization like a cooperative.

But better services come in easily if and only if coop officers, staff, and members are well educated and trained for their respective functions and responsibilities. And this is where the "controversial" CETF comes in. Officers, staff, and members need to be regularly updated on cop trends and developments to ensure the efficient, effective, and excellent operation of the cooperative in view of better services.

Definitely, the BOD sees the need to broaden the involvement of members in coop education and training, and it is even mulling over the possibility of endorsing the participation of members in national as well as international educational forums in the near future.

BBCCC ELECTION 2006

Incumbent Chair of the Board Atty. Bernard Padang topped this years election. Atty. Renato Fernandez, a three termer member of the BOD, who just served a one year rest also won in his comeback bid as member of the Board. Former Election and AIC chair Josephine Perez made good this time by occupying the third and last slot for the BOD edging former BOD member and also comebacking three termer Atty. Ruben Corpuz and Mr. Romano Bulatao, a first timer. Former Board member and Secretary, Nida Flavier was number one in the AIC position and incumbent AIC and likewise former Board member, Roberta Balanque eked a slim margin over incumbent AIC chair Rolando Lachica with Ms. Josephine Ocampo at the tail-end. For the nth time, Mr. Arturo Asuncion once again ran unopposed in the Credit Committee position. Vying for the lone seat in the Election committee, Atty. Armando Velasco, a former chair of the Elecom and former member of the Board, beat three candidates, all employees of the vote-rich SLU.

There were 11,500 pieces of official ballots printed which were allocated to the deputies for distribution to the members qualified to vote (members in bad standing cannot vote as per existing provision of the By-Laws). There were 8,523 ballots distributed to member-voters with 7,649 casting their vote for a voter's turnout of 90%, same turnout that of last year.

Atty. Zosimo Abratique, a member of the Legal Committee, appointed anew to serve as Interim member of the Election Committee since incumbent member. David Delinela, himself was a candidate for the same position. Election Committee (selected members) and the BBCCC scholars assisted during this years election yet again.

Generally, the conduct of the past election was credible, honest, orderly and peaceful, though there's still some minor but unavoidable problems encountered. There were no untoward incidents throughout the duration of the election period. No disqualification, protests and the like filed though there was a letter-request to re-canvass the election returns but after a thorough and careful deliberation among the committee members, such letter-request was dismissed because it was not sufficient in form and substance and for lack of interest of the candidate-requester.

Once again, the members of Election Committee would like to express to all the members, candidates, deputies, officers and management staff their heartfelt gratitude for all the untiring support for the eventual success of the recent elections.







For those who missed to attend our General Assembly last March 26, 2006, we are introducing some changes in our Grocery Group Procurement Service (GGPS). Beginning this April, we will be segregating your Grocery Contribution from your Fixed Deposit contribution. This will allow us to streamline our loan policy on determining the maximum loanable amount available based solely on one's fixed deposits, and the amount of groceries one can get from our Grocery Pick-up Center based on his grocery contribution.

Henceforth, the member enjoys the maximum value of groceries he may get from our Grocery Center depending on the maximum contribution he gives under his individual grocery account. There will no longer be any ceiling for one's grocery account. As an example, if one contributes Php5,000.00 to his grocery account, he may have the privilege of getting groceries worth up to Php5,000.00. We therefore enjoin everyone not yet covered who wish to avail of our Grocery Procurement privilege to fully contribute at least Php2,000.00 by December, 2007 to entitle them to that amount worth of groceries.

As we move on this year, let us remain supportive of our coop's program ever focused on our coop vision and mission. Let us sustain our spirit of cooperativism as we look forward to another fruitful and productive year. May God bless BBCCC and all of us in our journey towards extending help and services to everyone.
